Did you know that Santa Claus has resided in Brandon for many years? Those of us who have grown up in the Brandon area can vouch for that.

For many years, Richard Dahl, proprietor of Dahl's General Store, turned into Santa during the Christmas season. When Richard was no longer able to play the part, Cliff Lund was anointed by the Legion/Auxiliary to take over. Cliff was joined by his wife, Dorothy, as Mrs. Santa.

Santa would arrive by Otto Weinrich's cutter pulled by his handsome ponies, by fire truck, or

snowmobile. The snowmobile caused Santa some problems, however. As he was on his way, a snow bank mysteriously appeared in front of him; and he and his means of transportation tipped over spilling the contents of his bag all over the street. The rich ethnic heritage of our community has an impact on our Christmas foods, celebrations, and traditions. We all remember the good old favorite Scandinavian dish, lutefisk, which we of Scandinavian/Finnish heritage all enjoy. Leo Smedstad and Oscar Pladson used to have this dried cod delicacy in a container in front of the Brandon Meat Market. They informed their customers that the reason their lutefisk was so good was that the neighborhood dogs would visit and add a little moisture and flavor to the fish. (No wonder our mothers soaked the fish in water before preparing it!)

Not to be outdone, our neighbors of German heritage had their favorite dish, schwarzsauer. The ingredients were vegetables; dried apples, prunes, and raisins; spices; blood from a goose; and other parts of the goose we might throw away today.

Our Polish friends probably feasted on fried carp and barszcz (beetroot soup) with uszka (ravioli).

Today, we still enjoy foods from our ancestors' heritage, such as pfefferneuse, lefse, sandbakkels, kolachies, fattigmann, Russian teacakes, etc.

Folks in Brandon and Millerville have always looked forward to the Christmas programs and concerts at our local schools and churches. The Millerville Church of Seven Dolors has a Potluck Supper and Christmas Program every year. The CCD classes have the program, followed by the choir singing Christmas carols. The parish hall is decorated with a beautiful tree and greens.

Brandon Christmas Programs

Advent Sunday is a special Sunday for Chippewa Church in Brandon. A beautiful tree with twinkling lights is in its place at the front of the church before the service. Each member brings a tree ornament to place on the tree during the service while the congregation sings Christmas songs. Ornaments for children who have grown up and left the area and members who have passed on are also included for beautiful memories. New members add their ornaments each year.

Some time ago, the Chippewa Sunday School created and presented a drive-through Living Nativity the Sunday before Christmas. The children were dressed in costumes sewn and provided by the mothers. (See photo below.) The children were bundled in their warmest clothes underneath their costumes.

Grace Lutheran Church in Brandon created a bit of Christmas history when they had their Christmas Eve service in Ira and Lila Bergh's barn on their farm a mile southwest of Brandon. There were some animals in the barn at the time so the service included a partial nativity setting. This began during the Iran hostage crisis during the Carter years and continued until the hostages were released. Vern Challes hung a large star on the barn, which remained burning until the hostages came home.

Cold weather did not deter the folks at Grace from participating in these Christmas services. People would be bundled in their warmest clothes and wrapped in blankets. After the service, doughnuts and hot apple cider were served. If someone has pictures, the History Center would love to copy and preserve them.

What memories were created in the minds of the children and families! Our communities of Brandon and Millerville are proud of their Christian heritage.

Veterans' Corner – Brandon American Legion

The Argonne Forest Post #278 of the Brandon American Legion has been in existence since 1920. The purpose of the American Legion is to honor veterans of all wars and the men who died in service for our country.

When Post #278 was first organized, membership included veterans from Brandon, Evansville, Garfield, Moe, Urness Township, and Millerville.

Each year on Memorial Day, the Legion members would march to the Brandon Cemetery west of town on Old Highway #3 to pay tribute to their comrades. Memorial Day Services were held on the Brandon School Lawn until the Brandon Auditorium was built in 1936.

The Veterans of Foreign War, Post #936, also originated in Brandon; but in 1940, the Post was moved to Alexandria and is still active today.

After a short period of inactivity, the Argonne Post was reinstated on December 29, 1941, with 27

charter members. The first officers were Commander John Knudson, Treasurer Richard Dahl, and Adjutant Walter Hoving.

Following World War II, the Post had a membership of 117; and by 1949, there were 192, an all-time high in membership. As other neighboring towns started their own Legion Posts, membership numbers in Post #278 were greatly reduced.

Post #287 presently has about 60 members. Current Officers are Commander Lydon Sletto; Treasurer/Adjutant Bob Reynolds. The Post and Auxiliary continuing to be in active service to our community, longer than any other organization. Memorial Day Services are now held at the Veterans' Memorial Park located east of the grain elevator and at the Brandon High School.

The Legion and Auxiliary began sending high school juniors to Minnesota Boys and Girls State in 1955 and still continue to do so. The Legion has sponsored and still continues to sponsor youth baseball.

In 1993, during David Fjoslien's time as Commander, Grand Marshals were added to the Memorial Day Parade to honor veterans from the community. Clifford and Dorothy Lund were the first Grand marshals.

The American Legion has always played an important part in the history of Brandon, or of any community for that matter. Brandon's Memorial Day celebration draws many people. A delicious luncheon is served by the Legion Auxiliary in the Brandon School cafeteria. Thank you, Veterans!



Clifford Strom was born in Brandon to John and Julia Strom on August 31, 1916. He attended District 48 and Dunwoody Institute in Minneapolis, where he took welding classes. He moved to Milwaukee and worked at a civil defense factory, making parts for ships prior to World War II.

Cliff then joined the Merchant Marines. His group transported British and American troops and supplies between England and France, during the Normandy invasion. He was also involved in missions to New Zealand, India, and Africa. After the war, he owned and operated the Brandon School buses, a sand and gravel business, and Strom Construction. He was a lifelong member of Chippewa Lutheran Church of Brandon.

Cliff is survived by four children, seven grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren. He is also survived by one sister, and two sisters-in-law. He was preceded in death by his wife Viola, five brothers, one sister, and his parents. Cliff died on November 19, 2013.

Darold Plaster was born January 7, 1926, in Waterloo, lowa, to Ted and Elda Plaster. He attended Brandon High School, graduating in 1944.

As a teenager, he helped his dad on the dray line, delivering coal and hauling materials to help build the Brandon water tower.

He enlisted in the U.S. Navy in January of 1944 and served on the U.S.S. Cullman, carrying troops from the Philippine Islands to Japan. After his discharge in June of 1946, Darold attended Dunwoody Institute in Minneapolis and graduated with an auto mechanics degree.

Darold worked 34 years for Brinks Armor in Minneapolis. He also worked for his son, John, on his garbage route and worked at the Brandon school as a janitor.

Darold was a member of St. Ann's Catholic Church in Brandon. He was a member of American Legion Post 278 for 70 years. Darold died October 4, 2013. He is survived by his wife, Rita; four children; seven grandchildren; six great-grandchildren; one brother; three sisters-in-law, one brother-in-law; and many nieces, nephews and cousins. He was preceded in death by one brother, one grand-daughter, and two brothers-in-law.
