# **Brandon Fire Department** 125 Years of Service

In 1889, residents and businessmen established the Brandon Fire department. The original officers were Jacob Tamble, Berndt Tronbol, Prosper Seidlinger, Dr. Van Cappelan, and O. F. Olson, Fire Chief.

Over the years, equipment for fighting fires evolved from horse-drawn water wagons to their first International Fire Truck: a 1928 International; a 1949 Ford truck which was completely equipped with hose, chemical extinguishers, a booster pump and gas masks at a cost of \$5,070 which was raised after 10 years and 200 dances; a 1956 Pirsch truck which pumped 750 gallons of water per minute, fondly called "Old Number 4"; a new John Bean truck purchased in 1968 at a cost of \$15,000 that featured original high pressure fog and used



a limited amount of water; a grass rig; equipment van; and their current fleet of up-to-date firefighting and rescue equipment.

# **Church Cemetery History**

Church of Seven Dolors



Maintaining cemetery records is a mammoth job, as Florence Bitzan and Linda Wagner discovered as they tackled the task for the Church of Seven Dolors Cemetery in Millerville. However, in doing this, they found some very interesting history among the gravestones and the existing records.

Millerville's first church was constructed of logs harvested from the homestead of John Hockert, later known as Brooks farm. Sawed boards, nails, shingles, and windows were hauled from St. Cloud by ox teams. All construction was done by the parishioners in their spare time, after tedious hours spent on clearing their own land and planting their crops. Construction was completed by August 14, 1868, with Father Pierz conducting the first Mass on August 15, 1868.

The church was built on 20 acres donated by the mother of John A. Miller; the mother of Johann

Lorsung also donated 20 acres east of the church, which was intended to assist in the support of the church.

The Seven Dolors Cemetery is divided into three sections, with the oldest section being closest to the church. Each burial plot is numbered in each section, so graves are quite easy to find.

As Florence and Linda were going through the cemetery book and old tombstones, history of local residents began to emerge. It appears that the first person to be buried there was Apolonia Zeimantz, who died at the age of 44 on August 14, 1869.

Anna Hockert, daughter of John and Elizabeth (Schuster) Boesen and wife of Nicholaus Hockert, Sr., died at the age of 36 on September 14, 1869. Linus Wilm was buried in 1870. The first name

entered in the interment book was Barbara Blates; however, her tombstone was not located.

Burial records revealed that some families suffered through the loss of their children. In April 1899 the Nick and Carolina Hockert family lost four children to diphtheria. The children ranged in age from seven months to seven years, all dying within ten days of each other. Also Joe and Frances Revering had several children who were stillborn due to a blood disorder.


Tombstones were difficult to read due to age and because some of the wording was in German. Linda and Florence were able to give a location number for 868 tombstones. Even though the interment book has 1202 names listed, many of these graves had no markers, especially in the oldest section.

A book was prepared by these ladies listing each name in alphabetic order, with each burial plot having a Section-Row-Number. Also listed are birth/death dates, parents, spouses, and causes of death. The book is updated every year. Copies can be found at the Parish Office, Brandon History Center, and the Douglas County Historical Society.

In order to preserve history, it is critical to maintain cemetery records since quite often relatives drive miles to visit cemeteries in order to research their ancestors. With a reference book that ties into the tombstones in the cemetery such as the Seven Dolors Cemetery now has, it will be much easier to fill in missing historical information.

We give a hearty "Thank you!" to Linda and Florence for their hard work which began in 2010 and their diligence in tackling this huge project.

Quote from the Baden family: "We traveled 455 miles to Millerville, Minnesota, and found our great grand-mother's grave."



This beautiful iron scroll work cross is found on the grave of Gertrude Gorgen Baden, who is buried at the Seven Dolors Cemetery in Millerville. Gertrude died during childbirth in 1886. Her husband, Mathias Baden, made this in memory of his wife and installed on her grave site. It is beautiful and well-preserved and done by a master craftsman.

Mathias Baden was born in Trierweeler, Trier-Saarburg, Rhineland Pfalz, Germany. He settled in Millerville where he owned and operated a blacksmith and harness shop, which he later sold to Matt Kotchevar. A local resident Louis Klein was an apprentice at the blacksmith and was Mathias' brother-in-law. After remarrying, Mathias moved to Lake Elmo, MN.

This piece of history was provided to us by Debra Baden Drange and Diane Ayers, great granddaughters of Mathias Baden. We are grateful for their help in identifying this beautiful iron work.

The Brandon Community Club has been in existence since 1934, operating under the name of the Brandon Commercial Club until September of 1989.


