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Who Is Elsa Laubach Jemne?

Elsa Laubach Jemne is one of Minnesota's first generation of female artists. Her work can be found in our historic Brandon Auditorium and in various other public buildings around the state of Minnesota and beyond. She is recognized for her oil paintings and large-scale murals.

One of seven children, Elsa was born on July 7, 1888, in St. Paul to Mr. and Mrs. Albert Laubach. Due to an unfortunate turn of events in her father's business, the responsibility for funding any post-high school education fell on Elsa; so she went to work for several years as a commercial artist at Brown & Bigelow, an advertising firm in St. Paul. This was not the type of artist she wanted to be.

Unsatisfied as a commercial artist, Elsa enrolled at the St. Paul School of Art, attending classes in the evenings or as her work schedule allowed. Elsa did well in her classes and won a bronze medal for drawing. She also took classes in murals.

Longing to move somewhere so she could do "real" work which could change the world, in 1912, Elsa moved to Philadelphia to study at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts. Leaving her mother was difficult for her.

She went to work at the *Philadelphia Record* and Gimbel's Department Store, where she found herself doing fashion drawings, which she did not enjoy but it paid the bills.

Elsa's most influential teacher at the Pennsylvania Academy was Violet Oakley, who was a prominent mural artist. In 1914 she received a fellowship for study and travel in Europe. She spent most of her time studying in Italy, doing frescoes and sculptures. Meanwhile, World War I broke out so she returned to St. Paul for her third year of education. She did later return to Europe after the war for further study. After graduating, her career took off; and she was commissioned to do several murals in Pennsylvania and New York.

Elsa intended to return to the Eastern U.S.; however, she married Magnus Jemne, whom she met while staying at a St. Paul boarding house. Magnus was an architect by training and worked with Cass Gilbert whose firm designed many homes, churches, and public buildings in the Twin Cities, including the State Capitol.

Elsa and Magnus raised two daughters. Yet Elsa was determined to continue her career.

Murals were a major part of her work. Elsa's murals can be found at the post offices in Hutchinson, and Ely, MN, and Ladysmith and Lake Geneva, WI; the Stearns County Courthouse, St. Cloud, MN; the Minneapolis Armory; Central High School, Minneapolis; St. Paul's Women's City Club; and our own historic Brandon Auditorium (as well as other places around

The Great Northern Railroad commissioned Elsa to do paintings and murals for them. Subjects of her work included Native

Americans, which can be noted in the Brandon and St. Cloud murals. She apparently felt it important to depict the culture of each community that had commissioned her to create art work for them.

Elsa taught at the Minneapolis School of Art from 1946 to 1950. At that point in her life, she began focusing on easel painting and works on paper, which she exhibited regularly at the Minneapolis Institute of Art, the Walker Art Center, the Minnesota State Fair, and other venues in the Twin Cities.

Jemne suffered a serious stroke in 1962, after which she was not able to work much at her art work. Both of the Jemnes' daughters also became artists.

Elsa Jemne was very dedicated to her work and her family; and she was able to juggle the demands of both. She was admired for her ability and productivity in many art mediums and was an inspiration for many women pursuing careers outside the home.

Elsa died in 1974 at the age of 86.

Elsa's grandson, Adam Granger, has graciously provided the History Center with a portion of her diary entries while she was working on the Brandon project. It appears that she also may have done the art work for the two carved side panels (the Native American and trapper) that used to hang on either side of the stage.

Her notes indicate that she also worked on

designs for light fixtures for the "Brandon Community House."

According to Elsa's diary entries, she began her Brandon art work in December of 1935 and finished it sometime during the summer or fall of 1936. Elsa commented on her "struggling over the stagecoach wheels." Her diary entries can be found at the History Center—very interesting reading.

Much more could be said about Elsa Laubach Jemne, but her art seems to say it all. We feel very fortunate that we have one of her murals here in Brandon.

Douglas Backlund was born September 1, 1936, in Holmes City Township, MN, the son of Swan and Clara Backlund. Doug graduated from Alexandria High school in 1954.

Doug entered the U.S. Army in November of 1956. After his discharge, he was employed by MNDot where he worked until retiring in 1997. Doug was united in marriage to Lois Roiland in 1961. He was a member of Grace Lutheran Church in Brandon and a member of the Brandon American Legion Post 278.

Doug died on June 2, 2017, and is survived by his wife, Lois, three daughters, his grandchildren and great grandchildren. Funeral services were held with military honors by the Brandon Legion.

Elroy Wibstad was born May 31, 1932, in Brandon, MN, the son of Simon and Nora Wibstad. He attended school in Brandon.

Elroy served in the U.S. Army for three years during the Korean War. After his discharge, Elroy worked for Ray Strom, owned and operated a towing business, and worked for Pro Ag until he retired in 1995.

Elroy was a lifetime member of the Brandon American Legion and Alexandria VFW. He died July 31, 2018. He is survived by four sons, one daughter and his grandchildren and great grandchildren. Funeral services were held with military honors by the Brandon Legion.
